The partner districts shall provide and pay for any services, accommodations or modifications required under a student's IEP or 504 Plan while the student is enrolled in the CROP programs.

COMPREHENSIVE SAFETY PLAN

Content of the Safety Plan

The Coastline Regional Occupational Program (CROP) safety plan shall include an assessment of the current status of school crime committed on campus(es) and at CROP functions. (Education Code 32282)

The plan also shall identify appropriate strategies and programs that will provide or maintain a high level of school safety and address the CROP's procedures for complying with existing laws related to school safety. The plan shall include the development of all of the following: (Education Code 32282)

1. Child abuse reporting procedures consistent with Penal Code 11164
